AC Window Units.

If you select this option, you're on your own, and that's how they were designed to be--quick solutions.

Pros: Window units are inexpensive.

Cons: Placement in the window means leaks. Leaks mean inefficiency and mold down the line. They're also noisy and provide uneven temps throughout the house.



Central Air.

There are an array of options from standard units to energy efficient air conditioners that could qualify for a **federal tax credit** (depending on the year and government program. Check with a tax professional on eligibility.).

Pros: Energy efficiency, improved internal air quality, possible federal tax credit, less susceptible to leaks, improved resale value on the home. Central air offers even temperature control throughout the home.

Cons: A central air unit is more expensive than a single window unit.



Mini-Split AC System:

Unlike window units, these systems have their own separate condensing units and air handlers.

Pros: They're energy-efficient, include anti-allergy filtration, and can even be controlled remotely.

Cons: These systems work best for flat roofed rooms like a Florida room. They aren't designed to handle the whole home.
